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





TEST CIRCUIT 2 SWITCHING TIME




TEST CIRCUIT 3 GATE CHARGE

Server 2 FORWARD DIAC CAFE OREDATING AREA




Figure3. FORWARD BIAS SAFE OPERATING AREA




Figure4. SINGLE AVALANCHE ENERGY DERATING FACTOR






Figure 5. TRANSIENT THERMAL RESISTANCE vs. PULSE WIDTH




Figure8. FORWARD TRANSFER ADMITTANCE vs. DRAIN CURRENT




Figure 10. DRAIN TO SOURCE ON-STATE RESISTANCE vs. DRAIN CURRENT





Figure 7. DRAIN CURRENT vs. DRAIN TO SOURCE VOLTAGE

Figure9. DRAIN TO SOURCE ON-STATE RESISTANCE vs. GATE TO SOURCE VOLTAGE





Figure 11. GATE TO SOURCE THRESHOLD VOLTAGE vs. CHANNEL TEMPERATURE



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







Figure 14. CAPACITANCE vs. DRAIN TO SOURCE VOLTAGE 100000 V_GS = 0 V f = 1 MHz 10000

















EQUIVALENT CIRCUIT
