MPC8306 PowerQUICC II Pro Integrated Communications Processor Family Hardware Specifications

This document provides an overview of the *MPC8306 PowerQUICC II Pro* processor features. The MPC8306 is a cost-effective, highly integrated communications processor that addresses the requirements of several networking applications, including residential gateways, modem/routers, industrial control, and test and measurement applications. The MPC8306 extends current PowerQUICC offerings, adding higher CPU performance, additional functionality, and faster interfaces, while addressing the requirements related to time-to-market, price, power consumption, and board real estate. This document describes the electrical characteristics of MPC8306.

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# 1 Overview

The MPC8306 incorporates the e300c3 (MPC603e-based) core built on Power Architecture® technology, which includes 16 Kbytes of each L1 instruction and data caches, dual integer units, and on-chip memory management units (MMUs). The MPC8306 also includes two DMA engines and a 16-bit DDR2 memory controller.




Figure 1. MPC8306 Block Diagram

A new communications complex based on QUICC Engine technology forms the heart of the networking capability of the MPC8306. The QUICC Engine block contains several peripheral controllers and a 32-bit RISC controller. Protocol support is provided by the main workhorses of the device — the unified communication controllers (UCCs). A block diagram of the MPC8306 is shown in Figure 1.

Each of the five UCCs can support a variety of communication protocols such as 10/100 Mbps EthernetIEEE-1588, and HDLC.

In summary, the MPC8306 provides users with a highly integrated, fully programmable communications processor. This helps to ensure that a low-cost system solution can be quickly developed and offers flexibility to accommodate new standards and evolving system requirements.

### 1.1 Features

The major features of the device are as follows:

- e300c3 Power Architecture processor core
  - Enhanced version of the MPC603e core

    - Slave bus for CPU access of registers and multiuser RAM space

# 2 Electrical Characteristics

This section provides the AC and DC electrical specifications and thermal characteristics for the MPC8306. The MPC8306 is currently targeted to these specifications. Some of these specifications are independent of the I/O cell, but are included for a more complete reference. These are not purely I/O buffer design specifications.

# 2.1 **Overall DC Electrical Characteristics**

This section covers the ratings, conditions, and other characteristics.

### 2.1.1 Absolute Maximum Ratings

Table 1 provides the absolute maximum ratings.

### Notes:

- 1. Functional and tested operating conditions are given in Table 2. Absolute maximum ratings are stress ratings only, and functional operation at the maximums is not guaranteed. Stresses beyond those listed may affect device reliability or cause permanent damage to the device.
- 2. Caution: MV<sub>IN</sub> must not exceed GV<sub>DD</sub> by more than 0.3 V. This limit may be exceeded for a maximum of 100 ms during power-on reset and power-down sequences.
- 3. **Caution:** OV<sub>IN</sub> must not exceed OV<sub>DD</sub> by more than 0.3 V. This limit may be exceeded for a maximum of 100 ms during power-on reset and power-down sequences.
- 4. OVDD here refers to NVDDA, NVDDB, NVDDC, NVDDF, NVDDG, and NVDDH from the ball map.

# 2.1.2 Power Supply Voltage Specification

Table 2 provides the recommended operating conditions for the MPC8306. Note that these values are the recommended and tested operating conditions. Proper device operation outside of these conditions is not guaranteed.




Figure 2. Overshoot/Undershoot Voltage for GV<sub>DD</sub>/OV<sub>DD</sub>

# 2.2 Power Sequencing




Figure 3. MPC8306Power-Up Sequencing Example

The device does not require the core supply voltage  $(V_{DD})$  and IO supply voltages  $(GV_{DD} \text{ and } OV_{DD})$  to be applied in any particular order. Note that during power ramp-up, before the power supplies are stable and if the I/O voltages are supplied before the core voltage, there might be a period of time that all input and output pins are actively driven and cause contention and excessive current. In order to avoid actively driving the I/O pins and to eliminate excessive current draw, apply the core voltage  $(V_{DD})$  before the I/O voltage  $(GV_{DD} \text{ and } OV_{DD})$  and assert PORESET before the power supplies fully ramp up. In the case where the core voltage is applied first, the core voltage supply must rise to 90% of its nominal value before the I/O supplies reach 0.7 V; see Figure 3. Once both the power supplies (I/O voltage and core voltage) are stable, wait for a minimum of 32 clock cycles before negating PORESET.

### NOTE

There is no specific power down sequence requirement for the device. I/O voltage supplies ( $GV_{DD}$  and  $OV_{DD}$ ) do not have any ordering requirements with respect to one another.

# **3** Power Characteristics

The typical power dissipation for this family of MPC8306 devices is shown in Table 5.

### Notes:

1. The values do not include I/O supply power (OV<sub>DD</sub> and GV<sub>DD</sub>), but it does include V<sub>DD</sub> and AV<sub>DD</sub> power . For I/O power values, see Table 6.

 Typical power is based on a nominal voltage of V<sub>DD</sub> = 1.0 V, ambient temperature, and the core running a Dhrystone benchmark application. The measurements were taken on the evaluation board using WC process silicon.

3. Maximum power is based on a voltage of  $V_{DD}$  = 1.05 V, WC process, a junction  $T_J$  = 105°C, and an artificial smoke test.

1. Typical IO power is based on a nominal voltage of V<sub>DD</sub> = 3.3V, ambient temperature, and the core running a Dhrystone benchmark application. The measurements were taken on the evaluation board using WC process silicon.

# 4 Clock Input Timing

This section provides the clock input DC and AC electrical characteristics for the MPC8306.

### NOTE

The rise/fall time on QUICC Engine input pins should not exceed 5 ns. This should be enforced especially on clock signals. Rise time refers to signal transitions from 10% to 90% of  $OV_{DD}$ ; fall time refers to transitions from 90% to 10% of  $OV_{DD}$ .

# 4.1 DC Electrical Characteristics

Table 7 provides the clock input (SYS\_CLK\_IN) DC specifications for the MPC8306. These specifications are also applicable for QE\_CLK\_IN.

- 4. This represents the total input jitter—short term and long term—and is guaranteed by design.

1.  $GV_{DD}$  is expected to be within 50 mV of the DRAM  $GV_{DD}$  at all times.

2. MVREF is expected to be equal to  $0.5 \times GV_{DD}$ , and to track  $GV_{DD}$  DC variations as measured at the receiver. Peak-to-peak noise on MVREF may not exceed ±2% of the DC value.

3. V<sub>TT</sub> is not applied directly to the device. It is the supply to which far end signal termination is made and is expected to be equal to MVREF. This rail should track variations in the DC level of MVREF.

4. Output leakage is measured with all outputs disabled, 0 V  $\leq$  V\_{OUT}  $\leq$  GV\_{DD}.




Figure 4. DDR Input Timing Diagram




Figure 5. Timing Diagram for t<sub>DDKHMH</sub>




Figure 6. DDR2 SDRAM Output Timing Diagram








Figure 10. Local Bus Signals, GPCM/UPM Signals for LCCR[CLKDIV] = 4




Figure 11. AC Test Load




Figure 12. MII Transmit AC Timing Diagram




Figure 13. MII Receive AC Timing Diagram




Figure 14. AC Test Load




Figure 15. RMII Transmit AC Timing Diagram




Figure 16. RMII Receive AC Timing Diagram




Figure 17. MII Management Interface Timing Diagram








Figure 20. TDM/SI AC Test Load




Figure 21. TDM/SI AC Timing (External Clock) Diagram




Figure 22. AC Test Load






Figure 23. AC Timing (External Clock) Diagram





Figure 25. USB AC Test Load





Figure 27. eSDHC Clock Input Timing Diagram




Figure 29. I<sup>2</sup>C AC Test Load




Figure 30. I<sup>2</sup>C Bus AC Timing Diagram




Figure 31. Timers AC Test Load




Figure 32. GPIO AC Test Load





Figure 33. SPI AC Test Load




Figure 35. SPI AC Timing in Master Mode (Internal Clock) Diagram




Figure 36. AC Test Load for the JTAG Interface




Figure 37. JTAG Clock Input Timing Diagram




Figure 39 provides the boundary-scan timing diagram.





Figure 39. Boundary-Scan Timing Diagram






Figure 40. Test Access Port Timing Diagram








Figure 42. MPC8306 Clock Subsystem The primary clock source for MPC8306 is SYS\_CLK\_IN.

### 22.1 System Clock Domains

As shown in Figure 42, the primary clock input (frequency) is multiplied up by the system phase-locked loop (PLL) and the clock unit to create four major clock domains:

- The coherent system bus clock (*csb\_clk*)
- The QUICC Engine clock (*qe\_clk*)
- The internal clock for the DDR controller (*ddr\_clk*)
- The internal clock for the local bus controller (*lbc\_clk*)

The *csb\_clk* frequency is derived from the following equation:

### csb\_clk = SYS\_CLK\_IN × SPMF Eqn. 1

The *csb\_clk* serves as the clock input to the e300 core. A second PLL inside the core multiplies up the *csb\_clk* frequency to create the internal clock for the core (*core\_clk*). The system and core PLL multipliers are selected by the SPMF and COREPLL fields in the reset configuration word low (RCWL) which is loaded at power-on reset or by one of the hard-coded reset options.For more information, see the Reset Configuration chapter in the *MPC8306 PowerQUICC II Pro Communications Processor Reference Manual*.

The *qe\_clk* frequency is determined by the QUICC Engine PLL multiplication factor (RCWL[CEPMF]) and the QUICC Engine PLL division factor (RCWL[CEPDF]) as the following equation:

qe\_clk = (QE\_CLK\_IN × CEPMF) ÷ (1 + CEPDF) Eqn. 2

For more information, see the QUICC Engine PLL Multiplication Factor section and the "QUICC Engine PLL Division Factor" section in the *MPC8306 PowerQUICC II Pro Communications Processor Reference Manual* for more information.

The DDR SDRAM memory controller operates with a frequency equal to twice the frequency of  $csb\_clk$ . Note that  $ddr\_clk$  is not the external memory bus frequency;  $ddr\_clk$  passes through the DDR clock divider (÷2) to create the differential DDR memory bus clock outputs (MCK and MCK). However, the data rate is the same frequency as  $ddr\_clk$ .

The local bus memory controller operates with a frequency equal to the frequency of *csb\_clk*. Note that *lbc\_clk* is not the external local bus frequency; *lbc\_clk* passes through the LBC clock divider to create the external local bus clock outputs (LCLK). The LBC clock divider ratio is controlled by LCCR[CLKDIV]. For more information, see the LBC Bus Clock and Clock Ratios section in the *MPC8306 PowerQUICC II Pro Communications Processor Reference Manual*.

#### Clocking

In addition, some of the internal units may be required to be shut off or operate at lower frequency than the *csb\_clk* frequency. These units have a default clock ratio that can be configured by a memory mapped register after the device comes out of reset.

Table 53 specifies which units have a configurable clock frequency. For detailed description, refer to the "System Clock Control Register (SCCR)" section in the *MPC8306 PowerQUICC II Pro Communications Processor Reference Manual*.

As described in Section 22, "Clocking," the LBCM, DDRCM, and SPMF parameters in the reset configuration word low select the ratio between the primary clock input (*SYS\_CLK\_IN*) and the internal

The clock domains are independent, and each of their PLLs are configured separately.

### 23.1.1 Thermal Management Information

For the following sections,  $P_D = (V_{DD} \times I_{DD}) + P_{I/O}$ , where  $P_{I/O}$  is the power dissipation of the I/O drivers.

### 23.1.2 Estimation of Junction Temperature with Junction-to-Ambient Thermal Resistance

An estimation of the chip junction temperature, T<sub>J</sub>, can be obtained from the equation:

$$T_J = T_A + (R_{\theta} J_A \times P_D)$$
 Eqn. 1

where:

 $T_J$  = junction temperature (°C)

 $T_A$  = ambient temperature for the package (°C)

 $R_{\theta IA}$  = junction-to-ambient thermal resistance (°C/W)

 $P_D$  = power dissipation in the package (W)

The junction-to-ambient thermal resistance is an industry standard value that provides a quick and easy estimation of thermal performance. As a general statement, the value obtained on a single layer board is appropriate for a tightly packed printed-circuit board. The value obtained on the board with the internal planes is usually appropriate if the board has low power dissipation and the components are well separated. Test cases have demonstrated that errors of a factor of two (in the quantity  $T_I - T_A$ ) are possible.

### 23.1.3 Estimation of Junction Temperature with Junction-to-Board Thermal Resistance

The thermal performance of a device cannot be adequately predicted from the junction-to-ambient thermal resistance. The thermal performance of any component is strongly dependent on the power dissipation of surrounding components. In addition, the ambient temperature varies widely within the application. For many natural convection and especially closed box applications, the board temperature at the perimeter (edge) of the package is approximately the same as the local air temperature near the device. Specifying the local ambient conditions explicitly as the board temperature provides a more precise description of the local ambient conditions that determine the temperature of the device.

At a known board temperature, the junction temperature is estimated using the following equation:

$$T_J = T_B + (R_{\theta} J_B \times P_D)$$
 Eqn. 2

where:

 $T_J$  = junction temperature (°C)

 $T_B$  = board temperature at the package perimeter (°C)

 $R_{\theta IB}$  = junction-to-board thermal resistance (°C/W) per JESD51-8

 $P_D$  = power dissipation in package (W)

When the heat loss from the package case to the air can be ignored, acceptable predictions of junction temperature can be made. The application board should be similar to the thermal test condition: the component is soldered to a board with internal planes.

### 23.1.4 Experimental Determination of Junction Temperature

To determine the junction temperature of the device in the application after prototypes are available, the thermal characterization parameter ( $\Psi_{JT}$ ) can be used to determine the junction temperature with a measurement of the temperature at the top center of the package case using the following equation:

$$T_J = T_T + (\Psi_{JT} \times P_D)$$
 Eqn. 3

where:

 $T_I$  = junction temperature (°C)

 $T_T$  = thermocouple temperature on top of package (°C)

 $\Psi_{JT}$  = thermal characterization parameter (°C/W)

 $P_D$  = power dissipation in package (W)

The thermal characterization parameter is measured per JESD51-2 specification using a 40 gauge type T thermocouple epoxied to the top center of the package case. The thermocouple should be positioned so that the thermocouple junction rests on the package. A small amount of epoxy is placed over the thermocouple junction and over about 1 mm of wire extending from the junction. The thermocouple wire is placed flat against the package case to avoid measurement errors caused by cooling effects of the thermocouple wire.

### 23.1.5 Heat Sinks and Junction-to-Case Thermal Resistance

In some application environments, a heat sink is required to provide the necessary thermal management of the device. When a heat sink is used, the thermal resistance is expressed as the sum of a junction-to-case thermal resistance and a case to ambient thermal resistance as shown in the following equation:

where:

 $R_{\theta JA}$  = junction-to-ambient thermal resistance (°C/W)

 $R_{\theta IC}$  = junction-to-case thermal resistance (°C/W)

 $R_{\theta CA}$  = case-to-ambient thermal resistance (°C/W)

 $R_{\theta JC}$  is device related and cannot be influenced by the user. The user controls the thermal environment to change the case-to-ambient thermal resistance,  $R_{\theta CA}$ . For instance, the user can change the size of the heat sink, the air flow around the device, the interface material, the mounting arrangement on printed-circuit board, or change the thermal dissipation on the printed-circuit board surrounding the device.

To illustrate the thermal performance of the devices with heat sinks, the thermal performance has been simulated with a few commercially available heat sinks. The heat sink choice is determined by the application environment (temperature, air flow, adjacent component power dissipation) and the physical space available. Because there is not a standard application environment, a standard heat sink is not required.

Accurate thermal design requires thermal modeling of the application environment using computational fluid dynamics software which can model both the conduction cooling and the convection cooling of the air moving through the application. Simplified thermal models of the packages can be assembled using the junction-to-case and junction-to-board thermal resistances listed in the thermal resistance table. More detailed thermal models can be made available on request.

## 23.2 Heat Sink Attachment

When attaching heat sinks to these devices, an interface material is required. The best method is to use thermal grease and a spring clip. The spring clip should connect to the printed-circuit board, either to the board itself, to hooks soldered to the board, or to a plastic stiffener. Avoid attachment forces which would lift the edge of the package or peel the package from the board. Such peeling forces reduce the solder joint

lifetime of the package. Recommended maximum force on the top of the package is 10 lb (4.5 kg) force. If an adhesive attachment is planned, the adhesive should be intended for attachment to painted or plastic surfaces and its performance verified under the application requirements.

# 23.2.1 Experimental Determination of the Junction Temperature with a Heat Sink

When heat sink is used, the junction temperature is determined from a thermocouple inserted at the interface between the case of the package and the interface material. A clearance slot or hole is normally required in the heat sink. Minimizing the size of the clearance is important to minimize the change in thermal performance caused by removing part of the thermal interface to the heat sink. Because of the experimental difficulties with this technique, many engineers measure the heat sink temperature and then back calculate the case temperature using a separate measurement of the thermal resistance of the interface.

From this case temperature, the junction temperature is determined from the junction-to-case thermal resistance using the following equation:

$$T_J = T_C + (R_{\theta JC} \times P_D)$$
 Eqn. 5

where:

 $T_C$  = case temperature of the package (°C)  $R_{\theta IC}$  = junction-to-case thermal resistance (°C/W)

 $P_D$  = power dissipation (W)

# 24 System Design Information

This section provides electrical and thermal design recommendations for successful application of the MPC8306.

### 24.1 System Clocking

The MPC8306 includes three PLLs.

- The system PLL (AV<sub>DD2</sub>) generates the system clock from the externally supplied SYS\_CLK\_IN input. The frequency ratio between the system and SYS\_CLK\_IN is selected using the system PLL ratio configuration bits as described in Section 22.2, "System PLL Configuration."
- The e300 core PLL (AV<sub>DD3</sub>) generates the core clock as a slave to the system clock. The frequency ratio between the e300 core clock and the system clock is selected using the e300 PLL ratio configuration bits as described in Section 22.3, "Core PLL Configuration."
- The QUICC Engine PLL (AV<sub>DD1</sub>) which uses the same reference as the system PLL. The QUICC Engine block generates or uses external sources for all required serial interface clocks.

#### PLL Power Supply Filtering 24.2


Each of the PLLs listed above is provided with power through independent power supply pins. The voltage level at each  $AV_{DD}n$  pin should always be equivalent to  $V_{DD}$ , and preferably these voltages are derived directly from V<sub>DD</sub> through a low frequency filter scheme such as the following.

There are a number of ways to reliably provide power to the PLLs, but the recommended solution is to provide independent filter circuits as illustrated in Figure 43, one to each of the three AV<sub>DD</sub> pins. By providing independent filters to each PLL the opportunity to cause noise injection from one PLL to the other is reduced.

This circuit is intended to filter noise in the PLLs resonant frequency range from a 500 kHz to 10 MHz range. It should be built with surface mount capacitors with minimum effective series inductance (ESL). Consistent with the recommendations of Dr. Howard Johnson in High Speed Digital Design: A Handbook of Black Magic (Prentice Hall, 1993), multiple small capacitors of equal value are recommended over a single large value capacitor.

Each circuit should be placed as close as possible to the specific AV<sub>DD</sub> pin being supplied to minimize noise coupled from nearby circuits. It should be possible to route directly from the capacitors to the AV<sub>DD</sub> pin, which is on the periphery of package, without the inductance of vias.

Figure 43 shows the PLL power supply filter circuit.





#### **Decoupling Recommendations** 24.3

Due to large address and data buses, and high operating frequencies, the MPC8306 can generate transient power surges and high frequency noise in its power supply, especially while driving large capacitive loads. This noise must be prevented from reaching other components in the MPC8306 system, and MPC8306 itself requires a clean, tightly regulated source of power. Therefore, it is recommended that the system designer place at least one decoupling capacitor at each V<sub>DD</sub>, OV<sub>DD</sub>, and GV<sub>DD</sub> pins of the MPC8306. These decoupling capacitors should receive their power from separate V<sub>DD</sub>, OV<sub>DD</sub>, GV<sub>DD</sub>, and GND power planes in the PCB, utilizing short traces to minimize inductance. Capacitors may be placed directly under the device using a standard escape pattern. Others may surround the part.

These capacitors should have a value of 0.01 or 0.1  $\mu$ F. Only ceramic SMT (surface mount technology) capacitors should be used to minimize lead inductance, preferably 0402 or 0603 sizes.

In addition, it is recommended that there be several bulk storage capacitors distributed around the PCB, feeding the  $V_{DD}$ ,  $OV_{DD}$ , and  $GV_{DD}$  planes, to enable quick recharging of the smaller chip capacitors. These bulk capacitors should have a low ESR (equivalent series resistance) rating to ensure the quick response time necessary. They should also be connected to the power and ground planes through two vias to minimize inductance. Suggested bulk capacitors—100 to 330  $\mu$ F (AVX TPS tantalum or Sanyo OSCON).

### 24.4 Output Buffer DC Impedance

For all buses, the driver is a push-pull single-ended driver type (open drain for  $I^2C$ ).




Figure 44. Driver Impedance Measurement

To measure  $Z_0$  for the single-ended drivers, an external resistor is connected from the chip pad to  $OV_{DD}$  or GND. Then, the value of each resistor is varied until the pad voltage is  $OV_{DD}/2$  (see Figure 44). The output impedance is the average of two components, the resistances of the pull-up and pull-down devices. When data is held high, SW1 is closed (SW2 is open) and R<sub>P</sub> is trimmed until the voltage at the pad equals  $OV_{DD}/2$ . R<sub>P</sub> then becomes the resistance of the pull-up devices. R<sub>P</sub> and R<sub>N</sub> are designed to be close to each other in value. Then,  $Z_0 = (R_P + R_N)/2$ .

The value of this resistance and the strength of the driver's current source can be found by making two measurements. First, the output voltage is measured while driving logic 1 without an external differential termination resistor. The measured voltage is  $V_1 = R_{source} \times I_{source}$ . Second, the output voltage is measured while driving logic 1 with an external precision differential termination resistor of value  $R_{term}$ . The measured voltage is  $V_2 = (1/(1/R_1 + 1/R_2)) \times I_{source}$ . Solving for the output impedance gives  $R_{source} = R_{term} \times (V_1/V_2 - 1)$ . The drive current is then  $I_{source} = V_1/R_{source}$ .

Table 62 summarizes the signal impedance targets. The driver impedance are targeted at minimum  $V_{DD}$ , nominal  $OV_{DD}$ , 105°C.

### 24.5 Configuration Pin Multiplexing

The MPC8306 provides the user with power-on configuration options which can be set through the use of external pull-up or pull-down resistors of 4.7 k $\Omega$  on certain output pins (Refer to the "Reset, Clocking and Initialization" of *MPC8306S PowerQUICC II Pro Integrated Communications Processor Family Reference Manual*). These pins are generally used as output only pins in normal operation.

While HRESET is asserted however, these pins are treated as inputs. The value presented on these pins while HRESET is asserted, is latched when HRESET deasserts, at which time the input receiver is disabled and the I/O circuit takes on its normal function. Careful board layout with stubless connections to these pull-up/pull-down resistors coupled with the large value of the pull-up/pull-down resistor should minimize the disruption of signal quality or speed for output pins thus configured.

In addition to the maximum processor core frequency, the part numbering scheme also includes the maximum effective DDR memory speed and QUICC Engine bus frequency. Each part number also contains a revision code which refers to the die mask revision number.


